President's Report

CHILE CHALLENGE

This is my favorite time of year. Although the northern hemisphere has passed the autumnal equinox and days are getting shorter, there is a distinctive splendor. Mornings are cool and calm, there is little to no wind, and evening sunlight on wild sunflowers is soul soothing. Chile Challenge is a couple of weeks away and my memories turn to past Chile Challenges.

Chile Challenge is unique to New Mexico. Other events such as Easter Jeep Safari, Rock Junction, and Trail Hero all have great people, exciting trails, and spectacular scenery. But where else can you smell red chile being harvested as you drive past fields and smell fresh roasted chile as you pass processing plants. One year, a week or two before, the desert received a heavy rainfall.



Many trails changed from before as flash floods rearranged rocks and boulders testing all drivers and rigs. It's stunning to see debris caught on rocks and trees many feet above where your 4x4 sits. Equally astonishing is the explosion of wildflowers and cactus blooms as the desert celebrates a respite from the milieu's innate aridness. Also unmatched is the departure of hummingbirds and arrival of Sandhill Cranes. Each morning, shortly after dawn, waves of cranes leave their shallow water havens of Caballo lake and travel south to

numerous fields where corn has been harvested. Then, at dusk they return, in V-formation to again roost in the shallows. Their calls to each other retell the Autum story.

My history at Chile Challenge spans more than 12 years and fostered many friendships. It's heartwarming to meet up with folks who I haven't seen and pick-up where we left off a year ago. It's delightful to see folks that were young adults with toddlers and stock 4x4s when we first met and now their kids are teenagers, they have built-up rock crawlers, and are the event leaders! Eating fresh cooked chicharrónes, serving at the ice cream social, winning a tire gift certificate at the raffle, and sitting at a campfire and talking about the day's events, all make for uplifting memories.

Lunch was in a nice clearing, at noon. A few downed aspens,


